Commission Comments

1. <u>Presentation of Gavel to Outgoing Commission Chair Yanney</u>

Commission Chair Rose expressed appreciation to Commissioner Yanney for her leadership the past year and, on behalf of the Commission, presented her with a gavel commemorating her service as Commission Chair.

Commissioner Yanney said it has been a pleasure to be chair of the Commission and have the opportunity to meet a lot of folks.

2. Introductions of Commissioners Dan Huber, John Putney, and Leonard Boswell

Commissioner Huber said he is from Davenport, originally from Dubuque. He spent 15 years as chamber of commerce executive; three in Dubuque, four in Clinton, and eight in Davenport. Currently, he is president of Frontier Hospitality Group. They own two full-service hotels, one in Dubuque and one Davenport, and on June 10 will open up a new Holiday Express in Moline, Illinois at the Quad City International Airport. He and his wife, Sue, have been married 20 years and have three children. His interest in transportation started as a chamber exec. working for the Dubuque area chamber of commerce lobbying on behalf of projects in the Tri-State area. He said he is excited to be working with the other Commissioners and DOT staff. Our transportation system has a lot to do with our ability to grow, our quality of life, and the safety of our citizens.

Commissioner Putney said he is from Gladbrook where he has lived all his life. He went to the University of Nebraska and graduated from Iowa State University in agriculture. He managed the family farm in Gladbrook for about 25 years and then went to work for Senator Chuck Grassley as a special assistant fostering economic development events throughout Iowa. He was then asked by the Iowa State Fair Board to start a foundation to raise money to renovate and preserve the historic Iowa State fairgrounds, and he recently retired after 24 years of doing that. He also served two terms in the state senate. He and his wife, Emily, have been married 47 years and reside on their farm near Gladbrook. They have three children. He has always had a great interest in transportation because it is such an important part of economic development, tourism, and quality of life.

Commissioner Boswell said he lives in southern Iowa on a farm that is about three miles from where he was born. He said he didn't have a desire to be in public service until the Ag crisis in the late 70s/early 80s. He had just finished a 20-plus year career in the Army and came home to farm. He was involved in political service for 28 years in the Iowa Senate and Congress. When in Congress he was asked what committee he wanted to be on and he said transportation because he knew from his life experience that to move people, commerce and product safely and to grow, transportation is a big item. We need a safe and effective system for all modes.

Commission Chair Rose said Commissioner Boswell was a real asset in DC. It was the first time we have ever had somebody that knew his way around. Next time the other commissioners can provide their backgrounds for the benefit of the new commissioners.

3. <u>Clinton Delegation</u>

Commission Chair Rose introduced a delegation from Clinton. Mark Vulich, Mayor, said Commission Chair Rose has been an advocate for transportation and economic development in Clinton and will do a fine job as Chair of the Commission. The city of Clinton is very proud.

Edith Pfeffer, President, Highway 30 Coalition, congratulated Commission Chair Rose. In 1997 and 1998, when they first started working on transportation issues in Clinton, Commissioner Huber was sitting at the table with them so he is aware of how hard Clinton has worked for the improvement of their infrastructure and for transportation; that has been their goal.

Tom Detterman, Mayor Pro Tem, Clinton, congratulated Commission Chair Rose and the new Commissioners on their appointment. There is a lot of work to do; this is a great commission and we expect a lot out of you.

Commission Chair Rose said when the group started, we really did not even know where Ames was. He said he called Connie Page and she suggested we go in front of the commission at the public input meeting in Cedar Rapids. That was kind of their start.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said the City of Fort Dodge submitted a RISE Local Development funding request to construct approximately 570 feet of South 42nd Street and 3,600 feet of 1st Avenue South on the east side of town. The project is necessary to provide access to 14 lots totaling more 130 acres for industrial purposes. Under RISE Local Development criteria the project received a rating of 46 points. The total estimated project cost is \$2,900,535. The city is requesting a RISE grant \$1,450,268 and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Mayor Matt Bemrich.

Mayor Bemrich introduced the delegation and said they worked hard on this RISE application. It is a great project and fits into the idea of what RISE stands for in revitalizing Iowa's sound economy. They have been working to revitalize Fort Dodge, Webster county, and their region's economy; and transportation plays a key role in how that occurs. He noted Webster county was just selected as one of the first certified sites in the state of Iowa. These lots and facilities will host complementary industry that will come to their region to serve that certified site where Cargill, CJ and Valero have chosen to make investments today. They appreciate staff's efforts in working with them and the Commission's consideration of their application.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Miles moved, Commissioner Reasner seconded the Commission, based on the capital investment commitment and potential for future job creation, award a RISE grant of \$1,450,268 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE fund. 

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said the city of Sioux Center submitted a RISE Local Development funding request to construct turn lanes on U.S. 75, approximately 850 feet of 22nd Street NE and 660 feet of 2nd Avenue NE on the north side of town. This project is necessary to provide access to seven lots totaling more than 24 acres for industrial purposes. Under RISE Local Development criteria this project received a rating of 39 points. Total estimated project cost is \$949,732. The city is requesting a RISE grant of \$474,866 and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Dennis Dokter, Assistant City Manager, Sioux Center.

Mr. Dokter said he is the Assistant City Manager and Community Development Director for Sioux Center. This project consists of developing a 48-acre parcel into a general industrial park adjacent to U.S. 75. There is a demand for this type of development, and their total investment in this area will be about \$2.5 million. He noted they have been to the Commission before applying for RISE grants and have been successful in developing areas. He expressed appreciation to the Commission for past RISE projects and for the Commission's consideration of this project. They also look forward to having the Commission in Sioux Center in October.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Yanney moved, Commissioner Boswell seconded the Commission, based on the capital investment commitment and potential for future job creation, award a RISE grant of \$474,866 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE fund. 

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said the city of Holstein submitted a RISE Local Development funding request to construct turn lanes on U.S. 20, approximately 550 feet of Indorf Avenue and 1,250 feet of Hogrefe Drive located on the south side of town. This project is necessary to provide access to 11 lots totaling more than 33 acres for industrial purposes. Under RISE Local Development criteria this project received a rating of 35 points. Total estimated project cost is \$1,275,698, and the city is requesting a RISE grant of \$637,849 and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Rita Frahm, Ida County Economic Development President.

Ms. Frahm introduced the delegation. She said this proposed project will be the only industrial park they will have available in Ida county. The catalyst for the project is a local investment group that is stepping into the arena and providing the partnership with the city to have close to \$10 million in local investment to match what the Commission is providing so it is a unique opportunity.

Ms. Frahm noted on the north side of town VT Industries recently broke ground on an expansion. VT is a large employer for their community and has an international manufacturing base. The city also has ALMACO and Midwest Industries. She said they have been turning away other businesses that would like to locate in Ida county.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Yanney moved, Commissioner Miles seconded the Commission, based on the capital investment commitment and potential for future job creation, award a RISE grant of \$637,849 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project costs, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE fund. Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said the city of Des Moines submitted a RISE Immediate Opportunity funding request to construct approximately 800 feet of new roadway south of Hartford Avenue and west of SE 22nd Street at the James W. Cownie Baseball Park on the southeast side of town. Because this project will provide improvements to a facility that will support tourism, staff evaluated the application as a RISE Local Development project. Under RISE Local Development criteria, the project scored 34 points. The estimated project cost is \$500,000. The city is requesting a RISE grant of \$250,000 and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Ben Page, Parks and Recreation Director.

Mr. Page introduced the delegation. He said the success of government needs a lot of public/private partnerships. This facility, built in 2007, was built with mostly private dollars and, over time, has expanded. Now they have a safety problem they need to correct with a parking lot that does not meet the capacity needed. Monday through Friday the facility serves the local community with close to 400 kids playing games. Last year, for example, there were 191 games. On Friday the facility becomes an economic engine for the city with teams coming from all over for league team tournaments.

Commission Chair Rose said the Commission discussed this during the workshop this morning and thought it was very valuable.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Reasner moved, Commissioner Yanney seconded the Commission, based on the tourism impact of the improvement, reclassify the project as a RISE Local Development project in the February 2014 round of applications and award a RISE grant of \$250,000 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible projects costs, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE fund. All voted aye.



Michelle McEnany, Office of Aviation, said during the Commission workshop this morning, she presented the fiscal year 2015 Federal Public Transit Program. The program involves two funding streams. One is a federal formula program which is allocated to the 35 transit systems and is used for their operating expenses. There is also a capital pot of money of \$5.8 million that we are able to use to fund 42 vehicles to enhance lowa's transit fleet. She requested Commission approval of the FY 2015 Transit Program.

Commissioner Miles moved, Commissioner Reasner seconded the Commission approve the FY 2015 Transit Program (vehicle replacement) recommendations. All voted aye.

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, said this item is for information only today. The draft 2015-2019 lowa Transportation Improvement Program has been printed and an electronic version will be posted on the DOT's website immediately following this meeting so that we can collect public input between now and next month's business meeting. At the June business meeting the Commission will be requested to act on the highway program.

On the highway side, Mr. Anderson said this draft program documents your planned investment of approximately \$2.7 billion over the next five years to the primary road infrastructure system. This program continues to reflect the Commission's priorities in modernizing the existing infrastructure, addressing safety needs, improving bridge conditions on the primary system, and investing in critical interstate system needs that serve the economic growth of the state.
