DISCUSSION	/BACKG	ROUND:					

The department is proposing to amend the following Iowa Administrative Code chapters to conform to legislative changes regarding the periods of validity for driver's licenses and nonoperator identification cards; fees for duplicate driver's licenses and nonoperator identification cards; and veteran designations on driver's licenses and nonoperator identification cards.

761 IAC 602 – Classes of Driver's Licenses

761 IAC 605 – License Issuance

761 IAC 607 – Commercial Driver Licensing

761 IAC 630 – Nonoperator's Identification

The proposed amendments update the department's rules to conform to legislative changes made to:

- Iowa Code 321.189 and 321.190 providing for a veteran designation and allowing the veteran designation to be added on new, renewed, and duplicate cards (2012 Iowa Acts chapter 1091, S.F. 2112, section 2; and 2013 Iowa Acts chapter 82, S.F. 224, section 1).
- Iowa Code 321.190 changing the period of validity of a nonoperator's identification card from five to eight years, changing the fee for the card from \$5 to \$8, eliminating nonexpiring nonoperator's identification cards for persons age 70 or over, and waiving the fee for a nonoperator's identification card issued to a person that voluntarily surrendered the person's driver's license in lieu of suspension for incapability (2013 Iowa Acts chapter 82, S.F. 224, section 2).
- Iowa Code 321.195 increasing the fee for a duplicate license or nonoperator's identification card from \$1 for voluntary duplicates and \$3 for involuntary duplicates to a flat fee of \$10 for all duplicates (2013 Iowa Acts chapter 82, S.F. 224, section 3);.
- Iowa Code 321.196 increasing the standard term for a driver's license from five years to eight years, providing for a transition in which the department may issue five, six, seven, and eight year licenses to equalize renewal volumes in succeeding eight-year periods, and increasing the age at which drivers receive two-year licenses from 70 to 72 (2013 Iowa Acts chapter 82, S.F. 224, section 3, as amended 2013 Iowa Acts chapter 104, H.F. 355, section 1).

The public comment period ended on September 23, and no comments or requests for oral presentations were received.

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, said as Mark Lowe, Motor Vehicle Division, reviewed with the Commission yesterday, the Department is proposing several administrative rule changes to chapters 602, 605, 607, and 630. Specifically, these changes:

- Provide a veteran's designation to be added on new, renewed, and duplicate cards.
- Change the period of validity of an ID card from five to eight years.
- Change the fee for an ID card from \$5 to \$8.
- Eliminate non-expiring ID cards for persons age 70 or over.
- Waive the fee for a nonoperator's ID card issued to a person that voluntarily surrendered his/her driver's license due to inability to drive.
- Increase the fee for duplicate licenses or ID cards from \$1 for voluntary duplicates and \$3 for involuntary duplicates to a flat fee of \$10 for all duplicates.
- Increase the standard term for a driver license from five to eight years and provide for a transition in which the Department may issue five, six, seven, and eight year licenses to equalize the renewal volumes in succeeding eight year periods.
- Increase the age of which drivers receive two year licenses from 70 to 72.

The public comment period for these rules ended September 23, 2014, and no comments or requests for oral presentations were received. It is recommended the Commission approve the rules as proposed.

Commissioner Reasner moved, Commissioner Yanney seconded the Commission approve the rule amendments. Commissioner Boswell absent; remaining Commissioners voted aye.

ITEM 1. Amend subrule 602.11(1) as follows:

**602.11(1)** *Validity and issuance.* 

- a. No change.
- b. The license is issued for either two years or five eight years.
- (1) A qualified applicant who is at least 17 years, 11 months of age but not yet 70 72 years of age shall be issued a five-year an eight-year license. However, the expiration date of the license issued shall not exceed the licensee's 74th birthday.
- (2) A two-year license shall be issued to a qualified applicant who is under 17 years, 11 months of age or who is 70 72 years of age or older.
  - (3) No change.

ITEM 2. Amend subrule 602.12(1) as follows:

**602.12(1)** *Validity and issuance.* 

- a. and b. No change.
- c. The license is issued for either two years or five eight years.
- (1) A qualified applicant who is at least 18 years of age but not yet <del>70</del> <u>72</u> years of age shall be issued a five year an eight-year license. However, the expiration date of the license issued shall not exceed the licensee's 74th birthday.
- (2) A two-year license shall be issued to a qualified applicant who is <del>70</del> 72 years of age or older.
  - (3) No change.
- d. Rescinded IAB 11/8/06, effective 12/13/06.

ITEM 3. Amend paragraph **602.13(1)"b"** as follows:

b. The license is issued for either two years or five eight years.

- (1) A qualified applicant who is at least 17 years, 11 months of age but not yet 70 72 years of age shall be issued a five year an eight-year license. However, the expiration date of the license issued shall not exceed the licensee's 74th birthday.
- (2) A two-year license shall be issued to a qualified applicant who is under 17 years, 11 months of age or who is 70 72 years of age or older.
  - (3) No change.

ITEM 4. Adopt the following **new** rule 761—602.14(321):

761—602.14(321) Transition from five-year to eight-year licenses. During the period January 1, 2014, to December 31, 2018, the department shall issue qualified applicants otherwise eligible for an eight-year license a five-year, six-year, seven-year, or eight-year license, subject to all applicable limitations for age and ability. The applicable period shall be randomly assigned to the applicant by the department's computerized issuance system based on a distribution formula intended to spread renewal volumes as equally as practical over the eight-year period beginning January 1, 2019, and ending December 31, 2026.

This rule is intended to implement Iowa Code section 321.196 and 2013 Iowa Acts, chapter 104, section 2.

ITEM 5. Adopt the following **new** subrule 605.2(7):

605.2(7) *Voluntary markings*. Upon the request of the licensee, the department shall indicate on the driver's license the presence of a medical condition, that the licensee is a donor under the uniform anatomical gift law, that the licensee has in effect a medical advance directive, that the licensee is hearing impaired or deaf, or that the licensee is a veteran. To be eligible for a veteran designation, the licensee must be an honorably discharged veteran of the armed forces of the United States. A licensee who requests a veteran designation shall submit Form 432035, properly completed by the licensee and a designee of the Iowa department of veterans affairs.

ITEM 6. Amend rule **761—605.2(321)**, implementation sentence, as follows:

This rule is intended to implement Iowa Code section sections 142C.3 and 321.189, the REAL ID Act of 2005 (49 U.S.C. Section 30301 note), and 6 CFR Part 37.

ITEM 7. Amend rule 761—605.11(321) as follows:

# **761—605.11(321) Duplicate license.**

**605.11(1)** Lost, stolen or destroyed license. To replace a valid license that is lost, stolen or destroyed, the licensee shall submit Form 430052 and shall comply with the requirements of 761—601.5(321) and pay the replacement fee. The replacement fee is \$3.

**605.11(2)** *Voluntary replacement.* The department shall issue a duplicate of a valid license to an eligible licensee if the license is surrendered to the department and the \$1 voluntary replacement fee is paid. Voluntary replacement includes but is not limited to:

a. to i. No change.

*j.* Replacement to add a veteran designation to the license. To be eligible for a veteran designation, the licensee must be an honorably discharged veteran of the armed forces of the United States. A licensee who requests a veteran designation shall submit Form 432035, properly completed by the licensee and a designee of the Iowa department of veterans affairs.

605.11(3) Fee. The fee to replace a license is \$10. Anything in this rule, notwithstanding the fee for replacement of a license under paragraphs 605.11(2) "f" and 605.11(2) "g," shall be as set forth in Iowa Code subsection 321.189(6).

This rule is intended to implement Iowa Code sections 321.189, 321.195 and 321.208, the REAL ID Act of 2005 (49 U.S.C. Section 30301 note), and 6 CFR Part 37.

ITEM 8. Amend rule 761—605.20(321) as follows:

761—605.20(321) Fee adjustment for upgrading license. The fee for upgrading a driver's license shall be computed on a full-year basis. The fee is charged for each year or part of a year between the date of the change and the expiration date on the license.

**605.20(1)** The fee to upgrade a driver's license from one class to another is determined by computing the difference between the current license fee and the new license fee as follows:

a. and b. No change.

c. Converting Class M to noncommercial Class C with a motorcycle endorsement— $$1 $\underline{$2}$$  one-time fee.

**605.20(2)** The fee to add a privilege to a driver's license is computed per year of new license validity as follows:

Noncommercial Class C \$4 per year

(full privileges from a

restricted Class C)

Motorized bicycle \$4 per year

Minor's restricted license \$4 per year

Minor's school license \$4 per year

Motorcycle instruction permit \$\frac{\$1}{2}\$ per year

Motorcycle endorsement \$\frac{\$1}{2}\$ per year

This rule is intended to implement Iowa Code sections 321.189 and 321.191.

ITEM 9. Amend rule 761—607.16(321) as follows:

761—607.16(321) Commercial driver's license (CDL).

**607.16(1)** No change.

**607.16(2)** *Validity.* 

a. to d. No change.

e. A commercial driver's license valid for five eight years shall be issued to a qualified applicant who is at least 18 years of age but not yet 70 72 years of age. However, the expiration date of the license issued shall not exceed the licensee's 74th birthday.

f. A commercial driver's license valid for two years shall be issued to a qualified applicant 70 72 years of age or older. A two-year license may also be issued, at the discretion of the department, to an applicant whose license is restricted due to vision or other physical disabilities.

g. and h. No change.

**607.16(3)** No change.

607.16(4) Transition from five-year to eight-year licenses. During the period January 1, 2014, to December 31, 2018, the department shall issue qualified applicants otherwise eligible for an eight-year license a five-year, six-year, seven-year, or eight-year license, subject to all applicable limitations for age and ability. The applicable period shall be randomly assigned to the applicant by the department's computerized issuance system based on a distribution formula intended to spread renewal volumes as equally as practical over the eight-year period beginning January 1, 2019, and ending December 31, 2026.

This rule is intended to implement Iowa Code sections 321.177, 321.182, 321.188, 321.189, and 321.196 and 2013 Iowa Acts, chapter 104, section 2.

ITEM 10. Amend rule 761—630.2(321) as follows:

# 761—630.2(321) Application and issuance.

**630.2**(1) and **630.2**(2) No change.

630.2(3) The nonoperator's identification card shall be coded for identification only, as explained on the reverse side of the card. The county number shall indicate the county of residence. The card shall expire five eight years from the date of issue if the applicant is under the age of 70. A card issued to a person who is a foreign national with temporary lawful status shall be issued only for the length of time the person is authorized to be present in the United States as verified by the department, not to exceed two years. However, if the person's lawful status as verified by the department has no expiration date, the card shall be issued for a period of no longer than one year.

630.2(4) Upon the request of the cardholder, the department shall indicate on the nonoperator's identification card the presence of a medical condition, that the cardholder is a donor under the uniform anatomical gift law, of that the cardholder has in effect a medical advance directive, that the cardholder is hearing impaired or deaf, or that the cardholder is a veteran. To be eligible for a veteran designation, the cardholder must be an honorably discharged veteran of the armed forces of the United States. A cardholder who requests a veteran designation shall submit Form 432035, properly completed by the licensee and a designee of the Iowa department of veterans affairs.

630.2(5) The issuance fee is \$\frac{\\$5}{\$8}\$. However, no issuance fee shall be charged for a person whose license has been suspended for incapability pursuant to rule 761—615.14(321), or who has been denied further licensing in lieu of a suspension for incapability pursuant to rule 761—615.4(321), or who voluntarily surrenders the person's license in lieu of suspension for incapability pursuant to rule 761—615.14(321).

**630.2**(**6**) to **630.2**(**11**) No change.

ITEM 11. Amend rule 761—630.3(321) as follows:

# 761—630.3(321) Duplicate card.

630.3(1) Lost, stolen or destroyed card. To replace a nonoperator's identification card that is lost, stolen or destroyed, the cardholder shall submit Form 430052 and shall comply with the requirements of 761—601.5(321) and pay the replacement fee. The replacement fee is \$3.

**630.3(2)** *Voluntary replacement.* To voluntarily replace a nonoperator's identification card, the cardholder shall surrender to the department the card to be replaced. The reasons a card may be voluntarily replaced and any additional supporting documentation required are the same as those listed in 761—paragraphs 605.11(2) "a" to "i." "j." The fee for voluntary replacement is \$1.

630.3(3) Fee. The fee to replace a nonoperator's identification card is the same amount as the fee required to replace a driver's license. See 761—subrule 605.11(3).

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, said the State Recreational Trails program was created in 1988 for the purpose of developing and maintaining recreational trails and trail-related facilities for both motorized and non-motorized trail users. This funding is available to cities, counties, state agencies, local governments or non-profit organizations through an annual application program. The current round of applications were due July 1, and we received 56 recreational trail applications and one existing historic trail bridge application requesting, in total, over \$27 million in funding. A recommendation was reviewed with the Commission at the September workshop to award funding to 12 projects for a total of \$5,514,307. There is still \$500,000 remaining for historic trail bridges so we will be seeking applications that will be due January 2 for that remaining funding. He requested Commission approval of the State Recreational Trails Program funding recommendations.

Commissioner Miles moved, Commissioner Yanney seconded the Commission approve the State Recreational Trails Program funding recommendations as listed. Commissioner Boswell absent; remaining Commissioners voted aye.

Tamara Nicholson, Office of Rail Transportation, said the 2016 Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair program provides assistance to railroads and highway jurisdictions to repair rail-highway grade crossings. This funding is available to railroads, districts that own public crossings, and highway authorities. Applications must be submitted jointly by railroads and highway authorities to be considered for funding. A recommendation was reviewed with the Commission at the September workshop. The 2016 Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair program includes 12 projects for a total of \$976,500. She requested Commission approval of the program recommendations attached to the commission order.

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, reviewed a RISE Immediate Opportunity application from the city of Council Bluffs to reconstruct approximately 983 feet of Gifford Road and approximately 422 feet of 42<sup>nd</sup> Avenue on the south side of town. The proposed improvements will result in the retention of 109 full-time jobs and creation of 8 full-time jobs within three years along with \$14,497,132 in associated capital investment. The average wage of the retained and created positions is \$27.69 per hour which is 159 percent of the average labor shed wage rate. Based on the analysis of those positions and the requested RISE eligible project costs, staff recommends a RISE grant of \$935,445; that is 80 percent of the total RISE eligible project costs. The 20 percent match will amount to \$233,861. The recommendation is tied to 117 retained and created jobs within three years. That results in a RISE cost per job assisted of \$7,995.26 and a capital investment per RISE dollar of \$15.50. He introduced Don Gross, Community Development Director, Council Bluffs.

Mr. Gross introduced Terry Bailey, Pottawattamie Growth Alliance; Greg Reeder, Public Works Director; and Scott Reelfs. He encouraged the Commission's favorable adoption of this application. They recently adopted a comprehensive plan, and this area is designated for industrial development.

Mr. Anderson reviewed staff's recommendation.





Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, said Lyon County submitted an immediate opportunity RISE application requesting funds to reconstruct approximately 5,280 feet of Kingbird Avenue and approximately 980 feet of 200<sup>th</sup> Street to the development site of the expanded Diversified Technologies Inc.'s manufacturing facility located northwest of the city of George. 


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

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, presented a RISE local development application from the city of Sergeant Bluff to construct a new road from South Lewis Boulevard approximately 3,000 west toward Port Neal Road and a turn lane on South Lewis Boulevard on the southeast side of town. This project is necessary to provide access to 12 lots totaling more than 44 acres for light industrial purposes. Under RISE local development criteria, this project received a rating of 43 points. The total estimated project cost is \$1,630,468 and the city is requesting a RISE grant of \$815,234 and will provide the 50 percent local match. He introduced Jon Winkel, Mayor of Sergeant Bluff.

Mayor Winkel introduced Bill Gaukel, Mayor Pro-Tem; Dean Lefrentz, Vice President, Community Development Corporation; David Gleiser, Woodbury County Economic Development; and Barbara Sloniker, Siouxland Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Winkel said Sergeant Bluff was fortunate enough to get a RISE grant in 1983 which resulted in the creation of over 3,000 jobs. That project is still yielding benefits today as they just broke ground last week on a \$12.5 million skilled care facility on Sergeant Square Drive, one of the main roads in that RISE project. What the Commission does has impact, and it has made a huge difference for Sergeant Bluff starting in the 1980s. Mayor Winkel said he was encouraged to make a pitch for the U.S. 20 project. On this side of the state they view U.S. 20 as a key component to help them to continue to grow and be a vital part of the state.

David Gleiser expressed appreciation to the Commission for coming to visit this side of the state and for their service to Iowa and the Iowa Department of Transportation. He said he is here on behalf of Woodbury County to demonstrate their support for the Sergeant Bluff RISE grant application. This project will have a significant impact on economic development along that transportation route which is important and critical for not only Sergeant Bluff but for Woodbury county. Woodbury County and the city of Sergeant Bluff are working proactively not only to fund this project but to identify targeted industry to fill those lots, bring in new jobs, and generate new tax revenues. He also expressed appreciation for the investments the Commission has already made in the road system in Woodbury County and for recognizing that their road system is a critical piece to the state road system. In regard to U.S. 20, Mr. Gleiser said Woodbury County has communities along that corridor that are hungry for the development potential. They are working on comprehensive long-term strategies that are banking on that commerce traveling through their community. He encouraged the Commission to remain focused and diligent on identifying solutions for that road system.

Mr. Anderson reviewed staff's recommendation.


