## DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

A Notice of Intended Action was published in the September 19, 2012, Iowa Administrative Bulletin (see attached rule amendment). This proposed amendment revises 761 IAC $150.4(3) " \mathrm{c}$ " - Curb Ramps on Existing Sidewalks, providing for additional departmental participation in the cost of constructing curb ramps on existing sidewalks within the right of way of primary road extensions to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This change allowed the department to move forward with the ADA transition plan without being dependent on funding sources from local jurisdictions and removed the department's participation cap of $\$ 1.5$ million per year and 55 percent of the construction cost. No comments or requests for oral presentations were received by the department during the public comment period.

However, concerns were expressed during the October 9, 2012, Administrative Rule Review Committee meeting regarding the removal of specific funding criteria. The department has made some changes to the attached rule amendments to help ease those concerns. The proposed changes include the following.

- The department will fund 100 percent of curb ramps on department-initiated projects to eliminate the dependence on local jurisdictions for funding.
- The department will not strike rule language that allows the department to continue funding 55 percent of the curb ramps up to $\$ 250,000$ per year per local jurisdiction on local jurisdiction-initiated projects.
- The department will not strike rule language that allows the department to participate a total amount per year. However, the department has increased the total annual program amount to $\$ 5$ million to help expedite compliance with the ADA.


## PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission approve the attached rule amendment.

## Rule amendment as published in the September 19, 2012, Iowa Administrative Bulletin (Notice of Intended Action):

Amend paragraph 150.4(3)' c " as follows:
c. The department may participate in the cost of constructing curb ramps on existing sidewalks within the right-of-way of primary road extensions to meet the requirements of the Americans With Disabilities Act. If the department participates, the department's share of the construetion cost shall be 55 percent; the city shall prepare plans, award the contract, supervise construction, and be responsible for the remaining construction cost. However, departmental participation shall not exceed $\$ 250,000$ per year for any one city and $\$ 1.5$ million per year in total.

Proposed rule amendment to be published in December 12, 2012 Iowa Administrative Bulletin (Adopted and Filed):

Amend paragraph 150.4(3)'c' as follows:
c. If a project is initiated by the department, the department shall fund 100 percent of all curb ramps within the right-of-way of primary road extensions to meet the requirements of the Americans With Disabilities Act. If a project is initiated by a local jurisdiction, the The department may participate in the cost by funding 55 percent of the cost of constructing curb ramps on existing sidewalks within the right-of-way of primary road extensions to meet the requirements of the Americans With Disabilities Act. If the department participates, the department's share of the construction cost shall be 55 percent; the city shall prepare plans, award the contract, supervise construction, and be responsible for the remaining construction cost. However, departmental participation shall not exceed $\$ 250,000$ per year for any one eity local jurisdiction and $\$ 1.5$ \$5 million per year in total.

DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

In 1987 the Iowa Legislature provided that one-half of the Road Use Tax Fund be used for traffic safety improvements or studies on public roads under city, county or state jurisdiction.

The program provides three funding areas for candidate safety projects:

1. Traffic control devices.
2. Site-specific.
3. Research studies and safety initiatives.

The candidate projects and the recommendations from department staff and the state/county/city safety program advisory committee have been presented to the Commission for review and approval.

## PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission approve the FY 2014 Traffic Safety Improvement Program.
COMMISSION ACTION:

Jeremey Vortherms, Office of Traffic and Safety, said Commission approval of the state Fiscal Year 2014 Traffic Safety Improvement Program is requested. Staff recommends approving 50 applications for approximately $\$ 9.7$ million. There are 29 site-specific projects, 11 traffic control device projects, and 10 studies as listed in the attachment.

Commissioner Reasner moved, Commissioner Cleaveland seconded the Commission approve the FY 2014 Traffic Safety Improvement Program.

## DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

District 2 has negotiated the transfer of jurisdiction for a portion of U.S. 218 to the city of Janesville. The transfer segment extends from just south of Barrick Road (Bremer County Road C50) south to Seventh Street, approximately 0.368 mile.

The roadway segment will be transferred to the city in its present condition. The proposed transfer to the city will take place upon notification by the state to the city of the time and date of the official transfer.

The state will prepare and forward a quitclaim deed to the city for the proposed U.S. 218 transfer segment.

PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:
It is recommended that the Commission approve the transfer of jurisdiction for a portion of U.S. 218 as described above to the city of Janesville.

DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:
Staff will present the revised 2013 and proposed 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair Program.

A listing of the proposed program of projects is attached.

## PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission approve the revised 2013 and proposed 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair Program projects.
COMMISSION ACTION:

Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, reviewed the HighwayRailroad Crossing Surface Repair program. This program provides assistance for railroads and highway jurisdictions to repair rail/highway grade crossing surfaces. Funding is available to railroads and highway authorities through an annual application program. Applications must be submitted jointly by the railroad and the highway authority. He noted staff presented a recommendation to the Commission at the October workshop for the revised 2013 and proposed 2014 surface projects. The proposed 2014 lowa Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair program includes 12 projects for a total cost of $\$ 833,248$. He requested Commission approval of the recommendations as listed in the attachment.

Commissioner Wiley moved, Commission Yanney seconded the Commission approve the revised 2013 and proposed 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Surface Repair Program projects. Commissioner Reasner abstained; remaining Commissioners voted aye.

DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:
Staff will present the proposed 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Safety Program for warning device projects.

A listing of the proposed program of projects is attached.

## PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission approve the 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Safety Program.


Stuart Anderson, Planning, Programming and Modal Division, reviewed the HighwayRailroad Crossing Safety Program which provides assistance to railroads and highway jurisdictions to install or upgrade protection devices at highway-railroad crossings. Funding is available to railroads and highway authorities through an annual application program. The program provides 90 percent federal funding for the cost of safety improvements with the remaining 10 percent paid by the highway jurisdiction, railroad or a portion from each. Funding for this program comes from the Federal Highway Railroad Crossing Program which is a subset of the Highway Safety Improvement Program. Staff presented a recommendation at the October Commission workshop for the 2014 safety projects. Today's recommendation is to approve funding for 26 projects and associated statewide crossing closures. The total amount requested is $\$ 4,575,000$. He requested Commission approval of the recommendations as attached to the commission order.

Commissioner Rose moved, Commissioner Yanney seconded the Commission approve the 2014 Highway-Railroad Crossing Safety Program. Commissioner Reasner abstained; remaining Commissioners voted aye.

## DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

The city of Spirit Lake submitted a RISE Local Development application in the September 2012 round requesting a grant to assist in construction of approximately 740 feet of new roadway located on the northeast side of town. This project is necessary to provide access to four lots totaling more than 20 acres for light industrial and manufacturing purposes. This project is anticipated to be completed by September 2013.

The evaluation and rating for the project will be discussed.

PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, presented a RISE Local Development application from the city of Spirit Lake to construct approximately 740 feet of new roadway on the northeast side of town to provide access to four lots totaling more than 20 acres for light industrial and manufacturing purposes. Under RISE Local Development criteria this project received a rating of 46 points. The total estimated project cost is $\$ 301,038$. The city is requesting a RISE grant of $\$ 150,519$ and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Mark Stevens, Spirit Lake City Administrator.

Mr. Stevens said the city is in partnership with Iowa Lakes Electric Cooperative and local and county development corporations to develop the new East Lake Industrial Park. The property is located on lowa 9 and U.S. 71 on the east side of the city near East Lake, Okoboji. The application for Commission consideration today is for the initial segment of the street from $255^{\text {th }}$ Ave east into the park about 740 feet. Their plan is to construct the street as well as associated infrastructure to open four lots for development in the business park which will ultimately have at least 12 lots totaling 130 acres. On one of the four lots FedEx Distribution is building a new facility that they hope to open in May 2013. The street will serve FedEx as well as other future property buyers. They also have plans for continuing the extension of the street to the city industrial park and eventually connecting to the south on lowa 9 and U.S. 71. They are prepared to move ahead with this street construction in early spring of 2013 so they can be ready for FedEx.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, reviewed a RISE Local Development application from the city of Story City to construct an approximate 715-foot extension of Precision Parkway to provide access to three lots totaling more than 26 acres for industrial and manufacturing purposes. Under RISE Local Development criteria the project received a rating of 41 points. Total estimated project cost is $\$ 273,511$ and the city is requesting a RISE grant of $\$ 136,756$ and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Mark Jackson, City Administrator, Story City.

Mr. Jackson introduced Mike Jensen, Mayor, and said Mr. Markley provided a good overview. The only comment he would add is that they are turning companies away because they do not have an existing facility available. They have a private developer building a spec building and they want to open up another 26 acres in this industrial area. Currently, the city owns 114 acres along I-35. Four companies are located there that have an evaluation of about $\$ 28$ million and employ 150 individuals. The city has already invested $\$ 5$ million in this area. They see that there is a need for continued economic growth in this area. He expressed appreciation for the Commission's consideration.

Title 2013-2017 Iowa Transportation Improvement Program Amendment

DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:
A proposed amendment to the highway section of the 2013-2017 Iowa Transportation Improvement Program (Program) will be presented. The proposed amendment will allow the Iowa Department of Transportation (DOT) to advance three interstate stewardship projects to fiscal year (FY) 2013. In addition, nine new projects that involve investments in non-interstate pavement modernization and safety will be added to the program in FY 2013, with construction on these projects expected to begin in 2013.

The Program changes were possible because additional funding was made available after the Program was approved in June. The additional funding is available due to favorable construction project lettings, Iowa DOT budget savings, and receipt of federal funding that exceeded forecast amounts.

Detra Dettman, Director, Pathfinders RC\&D, a non-profit organization in Fairfield, said she represents some lowa byways regarding MAP-21 legislation. The byways support Option A for some of the reasons discussed this morning. In particular, they would be able to go after funding for larger projects as their concern is how the trickle down is going to affect those available dollars. Another concern is the multi-RPA region effect.

Ms. Dettman said she has concerns with how the input was acquired. The byways, in general, have not been brought to the table. Most of the byways are under the guidance of non-profit organizations so they are not directly tied to the RPAs and were not asked for their input. Because of that disconnect, they are concerned about the dependence on the RPAs and MPOs if looking at option D for future projects. Most byways involve multiple regions. Her byway in southern lowa spans four counties involving three RPA regions. The Great River Road spans the eastern side of lowa and involves many RPA regions. Trying to get all those RPAs on board would be a big task.

Ms. Dettman said because the byways aren't tied in with the RPAs/MPOs, the RPAs/MPOs are not champions of the byways so an educational process has to take place. The RC\&Ds, the non-profits, have worked with the local coalition members and have worked on the sustainability project for the DOT that resulted in the byway signs. The byway coordinators have been working with the local folks but, again, there is a disconnect from the RPAs so they will have to look at a big change moving forward because, right now, their projects probably are not going to be valued and they will have to do a lot of education to be looked at fairly by the RPAs and MPOs.

Ms. Dettman said there was talk this morning about looking at projects that were funded through the National Scenic Byway program. She cautioned the Commission in doing that because if going back three, five, or ten years, there were very few active byways. Loess Hills and Great River Road received most of the funds. Through the support of the DOT and the sustainability project, the byways are poised to get projects going in all parts of the state. They are in a growth period and want to keep moving forward and don't want unintended consequences jeopardizing what they can do with the byways.

Commission Chair Miles expressed appreciation for the byway's perspective.
