Commissioner Fehrman made a motion to approve the minutes as written. Commissioner Maher seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Commission Comments

Commissioner Fehrman said the Commission and Department of Transportation Staff had the opportunity to spend three days in Washington D.C. last week.

First, I would like to thank the staff that joined us and those that were responsible for planning the trip. The access we had to our congressional delegation and the information that we shared with them and they shared with us was impressive.

We started at AASHTO, The American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials, an organization that is instrumental in the development of national transportation policy. They also provide training and technical support to State Departments of Transportation including Iowa.

A highlight of that visit included discussion of Transportation Revenue Options, both existing sources and new ones. If anyone is interested in seeing the specifics of their presentation, Department staff would be able to provide that to you.

We were able to spend time in the offices of all of our **Congressional Delegates**, which included face to face time with Senators Grassley and Ernst and Representatives Young and Loebsack.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THESE VISITS INCLUDED TWO PRIMARY ISSUES: The First of these was Congressionally Authorized Federal Transportation Funding.

Our current funding is provided through The FAST Act which expires September 30, 2020. Because we are already programmed through 2022, we stressed the importance of replacing this bill in a timely manner with another multi-year authorization bill that continues to provide funding certainty and fully funds the Highway Trust Fund at minimum 2020 levels.

Next was the Administration's Infrastructure Proposal; One principle of the proposal is to reward states that find new revenue streams to fund infrastructure. Iowa was ahead of the curve by approving the Gas Tax in 2015. We would like to

see the definition of NEW revenue streams include our Gas Tax and not penalize us for our foresightedness.

Another principle is to incentivize private investment in public infrastructure. This concept is challenging for rural states because Private investment requires a return that cannot be supported in less densely populated areas. In DC we pushed for a dedicated "Rural Fund" in the proposal that would not require rural states to compete against more populated areas of the country for this pot of the funding.

One note: after completing our presentation to Senator Grassley, he asked, "When will I be able to drive between Fort Dodge and Sioux City on four laned Highway 20? Director Lowe responded that the ribbon cutting is scheduled for October of 2018. Grassley responded—Then we are on to Highway 30! So, to Adam Schweers and the Highway 30 Coalition your voices are being heard in high places.

We also met with Doug Hoelscher, Special Assistant to the President & Deputy Director of Intergovernmental Affairs and an Iowan!

The highlight of this visit was discussion regarding Streamlining the Federal Permitting and Regulatory Processes. Iowa DOT is currently securing 408 permits from the Corps of Engineers. Improvements in this area will be very impactful on the Departments ability to deliver projects at a lower cost and in a more timely manner.

We have a lot of reasons to be proud of the State of Iowa and its Department of Transportation. When Director Lowe discussed Iowa's Gas Tax, the approval of the Federal Aid Swap by the Legislature and its implementation by this Commission and The Departments work to build a coalition with our neighboring states and the Corp of Engineers to improve the Locks and Dams on the Upper Mississippi through public private partnerships, our audiences could not have been more impressed.

Lastly, I would like to give a special thank you to Chairman Putney, who does not believe in down time. Any break between meetings started with him saying, "We have some time, I have an idea." Because of his initiative we were able to take

advantage of cultural opportunities in DC which included a trip to the Ford Theater and to Arlington National Cemetery.

Commissioner Rielly said that this was a great trip, it means a lot to take the time to visit national elected officials and stress the importance roads, bridges, and infrastructure in general.

Mason City submitted a RISE Immediate Opportunity application requesting a grant to assist in construction of approximately 2,400 feet of 27th Street Southwest, and turn lanes at 43rd Street Southwest and Pierce Avenue and also at Pierce Avenue and 27th Street Southwest located on the south side of town. This project is anticipated to be completed by November 2018.

Because this project will provide improved access to more than 61 acres for industrial purposes and to maximize RISE support for this project, staff evaluated the application as a RISE Local Development project.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning; We have one RISE project from Mason City for your review today. There is a delegation present if you have any questions for them following my presentation of background information. The city submitted an Immediate Opportunity RISE funding request to construct of approximately 2,400 feet of 27th Street Southwest, and turn lanes on 43rd Street Southwest and Pierce Avenue and also turn lanes at Pierce Avenue and 27th Street Southwest located on the south side of town.

Because this project will provide improved access to more than 61 acres for industrial purposes and to maximize RISE support for this project, staff evaluated the application as a RISE Local Development project. The RISE Local Development criteria the project scored 68 points. Total estimated cost of this project is 2,253,750. The city is requesting a RISE grant of \$1,126,875 and will be providing 50% in local match.




