Commission Comments

1. <u>Monday's Tour</u>

Commissioner Miles said the tour began from the Hotel Pattee, and we traveled the lowa 141 corridor to lowa 92 and then across to Indianola and saw the proposed changes that are going to happen there. She noted the Commission was riding in a wide bus on a narrow road which accentuates the need for some improvements. Then we drove U.S. 65/U.S. 69 and went over the new overflow bridges that were constructed to help mitigate flooding for the city of Des Moines and up Iowa 330 to review the interchange that has been in the news lately and then went to the Ankeny airport. We wrapped up the tour by having a delightful walk across the High Trestle Bridge Trail.

Commissioner Miles said the tours are helpful to the Commissioners. It was particularly helpful for her because she gets lots of questions from people about what is happening in the area so it is good to have the inside scoop. All-in-all it was a great tour and she expressed appreciation to District Engineers Jim Armstrong and Scott Dockstader and all the DOT staff that put the tour together.

2. <u>Five-Year Program Process</u>

Commissioner Reasner said she was asked to provide a brief overview as to our process regarding transportation improvement planning. Today the Commission will be presented the 2015 – 2019 Iowa Transportation Improvement Program for approval. This program is a culmination of many hours on the part of staff and the Commission. She noted over the last six or seven years we have developed a process involving decision points which has become a useful process as we look at funding issues, analyze priorities, determine objectives, and, ultimately, select projects from a long list of projects across the state that are meritorious but can't all be funded. She said the Commission has made policy decisions regarding how we choose projects. We are dedicated to maintaining the existing system so we set aside a portion of our program in order to be good stewards of the system that we have been given to govern and oversee. We also pay close attention to safety issues, capacity issues, and economic development so we are putting all these policy choices into the mix as we look at which projects to fund. A top priority is to finish things we have started so we have been dedicated to completing some large projects on the interstate system as well as the state highway system.

Commissioner Reasner said she hopes people pay particular attention to the citizens' letter at the beginning of the program because we are talking about a concern that has been on the horizon for a few years. We are not sure what will happen with the federal funding that makes up approximately half our budget. The Commission and staff have had a number of conversations in trying to identify what we will do if Congress either does not pass a continuing resolution in order to fund transportation or fails to find a new way of funding transportation infrastructure in the United States. We have identified that issue in the citizens' letter but she wanted the public to understand that if we do not get the federal funding that we expect either partially or fully, we will review this transportation improvement program and whittling out projects. We have identified criteria for that process including where the project in its construction phase, statewide equity issues, the number of times the project has previously been bumped, etc. She wants everyone listening or in the audience to understand that depending on what Congress does, we may have some hard choices ahead of us but we are planning for those choices.

Commissioner Reasner said she appreciates all the work the Commission has done but she appreciates more the work that staff has done and their guidance and information. Thank you to Stuart Anderson and his team and Director Trombino III on assisting us and working through these difficult decisions.

3. Update on Federal Funding

Director Trombino III said like a lot of states we are monitoring the situation in Washington, D.C. in regard to the Highway Trust Fund and potential zero balance that is on the horizon. The good news is they are starting to recognize the issue and some proposals have been put on the table to resolve the issue. At this point we are anticipating that if it doesn't get resolved within the next few weeks that the U.S. DOT could likely go to partial payments at the end of July which would cause us to start making choices about how we manage the program as we go forward. He expects this will go down to the wire; and we just need to make sure we are taking steps so that we don't get caught by anything in the future. He said staff will continue to review the situation in the weeks before the July Commission meeting. Hopefully we can provide more information regarding any potential decisions that need to be made at that time.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said Linn County submitted a RISE Local Development funding request to construct approximately 2,400 feet of roadway from lowa 13 northeast to County Home Road, 2,560 feet of widening and turn lanes on County Home Road, and turn lanes on lowa 13 at the proposed Prospect Meadows baseball and softball facility to be located northeast of Marion. This project is necessary to provide access to the facility to support tourism. Under RISE Local Development criteria this project received a rating of 36 points. Total estimated project cost is \$2,597,608, and Linn County is requesting a RISE grant of \$1,298,804 and will provide a 50 percent local match. He introduced Jack Roeder, President of Prospect Meadows.

Mr. Roeder introduced the delegation attendees and said they appreciate the opportunity to come today and be considered for this grant. This is a tremendous project involving a 17-field complex that they are going to build in Linn County. Eight of 16 fields will be larger fields with 400-foot fences and the other eight would be smaller fields with 300 foot fences so there will be a wide variety in what they will be able offer in terms of girls' softball and boys' baseball as well as adult softball.

Mr. Roeder said he was general manager for the Cedar Rapids Kernels for 20 years. During that time people would say to him that they wished there was something in Linn County so they didn't always have to travel every weekend. He retired from the Kernels in 2010, was approached by this group, and fell in love with this project because it was a non-profit organization and the proceeds will go back to non-profit charities in Linn County. It was a way to bring needed ball diamonds to the community for local play and tournaments. When he retired he started following his grandson to Des Moines, Grinnell, Ankeny, Kansas City, etc. and it made him more passionate about doing this because he has seen what this brings to the hotels and restaurants.

Mr. Roeder said Perfect Game USA, located in Cedar Rapids, is the world's largest scouting service. They hold tournaments all over the United States but very little in Cedar Rapids because Iowa is the only state that plays summer high school baseball so there are no fields for Perfect Game to hold their events. They do hold one event at the end of the year for the Kernels where the money goes to the Kernel's foundation and back to the community for recreational areas. Last year there were 44 teams in the tournament but they turned away 106 teams that wanted to play because Cedar Rapids didn't have the fields to accommodate them. He said Perfect Game put a mock schedule together for when this facility is done and the first year they could have seven week-long tournaments of 64 teams each so this facility will have a tremendous economic impact and that is only for the eight larger fields. He noted eight out of ten players in the major leagues go through Perfect Game events. Every first round draft pick played in Perfect Game events this past year. Perfect Game did 42,000 hotel rooms in the month of June in Atlanta. For Linn County it is going to be up to 80,000 hotel rooms per year. Of those 80,000 hotel rooms, he would guess the majority of guests will be from outside Iowa coming from Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, etc.

Mr. Roeder said there is a 17th field called a Miracle field. There is one in Des Moines next to the Iowa Cubs stadium and he understands that has been so successful that another field has been built in Ankeny. You actually have to apply to the Miracle league located in Atlanta to build a field, and the Miracle League is excited about this facility. The main reason they like to have the Miracle Field inside a bigger complex is so that special needs children can integrate with the general population. Here you will have to walk by the Miracle Field to get into this complex so they will have a tremendous number of people watching their games. Also, there will be a playground for special need children.

Mr. Roeder said this is about an \$11 million project so it is important to get this road put in. He noted a private fundraising drive has raised just under \$3 million and they hope to conclude the private fundraising drive this year. They are also working for some public funds with the city of Cedar Rapids. The city of Marion is already on board for \$750,000, and they are also working with state agencies.

Commission Chair Rose noted the Commission reviewed this quite extensively at our workshop yesterday.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Yanney moved, Commissioner Reasner seconded the Commission, based on the tourism impact of the improvements, award a RISE grant of \$1,298,804 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the county share of the RISE fund. All voted aye.

Description: That portion of existing Iowa 934 within the corporation limits of the city of Cedar Falls and extends from the Iowa 58/27 interchange to the east corporation limits of Cedar Falls, a total length of approximately 2.052 miles.

The state shall transfer funds to the city in the amount of \$20 million, which represents the estimated costs to reconstruct the proposed roadway segment, including complete pavement removal and reconstruction of University Avenue from Iowa 58 to Midway Drive; a one-time allowance for future roadway maintenance until such time as the roadway reconstruction is complete; and an allowance to compensate the city for future project design and contract administration costs.

The proposed transfer to the city will take place upon the state's payment to the city and written notification by the state to the city of the time and date of official transfer.

The state will prepare and forward a quitclaim deed to the city for the proposed lowa 934 transfer segment.
