1. <u>Monday's Tour</u>

Commissioner Rose briefly reviewed Monday's tour route which included U.S. 61 to Grandview, Iowa 92 through Columbus Junction to U.S. 218, south on U.S. 218 to Iowa 16 and then to the Burlington airport where the group had lunch and heard a presentation from Air Choice One. After lunch the group toured the fertilizer plant in Wever. That place is so huge that they have their own street signs. They currently have 3,800 construction jobs, and there will be 200 permanent jobs. He thought the fertilizer plant changed the dynamics of this entire area. The tour was great, and he expressed appreciation to Jim Armstrong, Mark Van Dyke and Jason Huddle, District 5 DOT Office, for their work in putting the tour together.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said last month the fiscal year 2016 State Aviation program was presented to the Commission for review. Iowa DOT staff recommends approval of a little over \$3 million for the Airport Improvement program for airport safety and improvement projects. The list of those projects as presented in the Commission workshop is attached to the commission order. Iowa DOT also requests approval of the Vertical Infrastructure program. The Commercial Service Vertical Infrastructure program was once again appropriated \$1.5 million to be allocated by formula to all eight commercial service airports and the General Aviation Vertical Infrastructure was appropriated \$750,000 for a competitive grant application program. Staff recommends funding projects at ten airports. The list of these projects is also attached to the commission order for Commission approval.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said at the July 14 Transportation Commission workshop we had discussion concerning the RISE policies used to evaluate and administer projects. We recommended Commission approval of the RISE policies as attached to the commission order.

Commissioner Reasner moved, Commissioner Rose seconded the Commission approve the attached RISE policies. Commissioner Miles absent, remaining Commissioners voted aye.

Revitalize Iowa's Sound Economy (RISE) Policies Effective August 11, 2015, Iowa Transportation Commission Business Meeting

Annual laborshed wage rate

• A company's ability to meet 100 percent of the annual laborshed rate for their area will be used to assist in determining RISE participation.

Project Completion Settlement Process

- First 50 percent of RISE funding not subject to settlement calculation.
- Settlement prorated against RISE funding beyond first 50 percent.
- In evaluating job contingency requirements, consideration will be given to jobs created from a different company that locates at the site of the original RISE-supported development. These jobs are subject to the same monitoring period as the original RISE development and will be evaluated based on wage rate, benefits and other RISE eligibility requirements.
- If at least 90 percent of the job creation and/or retention contingency is met at the wage rate established at the time of project approval, the project is considered substantially complete.
- Settlement installment payments calculated based on the prime interest rate minus 3 percent.

Monitoring process

- In monitoring job contingency requirements, initial payroll is required to establish baseline data.
- Three years after the roadway is open to traffic, the job creation and/or retention along with the wage rate contingencies must be met. Review and calculate average number of jobs created and/or retained using payrolls from the beginning and end of any six-month period from the time funding is awarded to three years after the RISE infrastructure improvement is complete.
- Submittal of documentation in cases of job turnover for establishing compliance with agreement contingency is allowable.

RISE cost per job increase

• \$12,000 per job maximum.

Local development funding

- Funding used for speculative RISE-eligible (nonretail) development.
- RISE participation held to 50 percent of eligible project costs.

Iowa's Certified Sites Program (IEDA) RISE Local Development applications

- Maximum RISE participation awarded is variable depending on the acreage of the Certified Site:
 - o 50-499 acres; up to 60 percent RISE participation
 - o 500-999 acres; up to 65 percent RISE participation
 - o 1,000 acres or more; up to 70 percent RISE participation
- A funding commitment may be considered by the Commission following receipt and review of an
 application for RISE funding. Final details of RISE project scope and maximum RISE award
 dollar amount will be finalized and brought for consideration by the Commission as a
 modification to the RISE award once determined through further discussion between the
 applicant and Iowa DOT staff.
- Projects awarded RISE Local Development assistance may be modified in the event that a
 business location decision is imminent. Following submission of the necessary information, the
 roadway project may be converted at the Commission's discretion to a more typical RISE
 Immediate Opportunity project qualifying for up to 80 percent RISE participation.
- A RISE Local Development funding commitment for a Certified Site under these policies will
 expire according to the same schedule as the certification of the site expires through the IEDA
 Certified Sites program.

Double access issue

• Interpretation has been to not fund RISE projects that create more than one access unless necessary to support additional entrances to a business or the project is the last link in the street/highway network. RISE funding will not be provided for more than one access unless

• necessary to support RISE-eligible development or where necessary to support an IEDA designated Certified Site.

Loan interest rate

• RISE loan installment payments calculated using an interest rate between zero percent and the 10-year U.S. Treasury bond rate based on the quality of the RISE project.

Addition of RISE funding to a previously awarded project

 Allow the addition of RISE funding by Iowa Transportation Commission approval if the road construction has not started yet or the RISE-supported company construction has not been completed.

Roads/streets previously improved with RISE funding

• Additional funding for previously RISE-funded projects not allowed. However, new projects for capacity improvements necessary to support immediate job creation decision will be considered.

Revitalize Iowa's Sound Economy (RISE) Application – Oelwein (Delegation)

DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

The city of Oelwein submitted a RISE Immediate Opportunity application requesting a grant to assist in the construction of approximately 2,825 feet of 14th Street Southeast and turn lanes on Outer Road located on the southeast side of town. This project is anticipated to be completed by December 2016.

This improvement is necessary to provide access to East Penn Manufacturing, a manufacturer of lead-acid batteries. This company conforms to the legislative requirements of the RISE program.

The improvement will support:

- The creation of 140 new full-time jobs.
- \$66,867,468 in associated capital investment.

The RISE cost per job assisted will be \$11,928 and there will be a total capital investment of \$40.04 for each RISE dollar requested.

PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission, based on the capital investment and job creation commitments, award a RISE grant of \$1,669,870 or up to 80 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE Fund.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, said the city of Oelwein submitted an Immediate Opportunity RISE funding request to construct approximately 2,825 feet of 14th Street Southeast and turn lanes on Outer Road located on the southeast side of town. The proposed improvements will result in the creation of 140 new full-time jobs within three years along with \$66,867,468 in associated capital investment. Average wage of the created positions is \$17.26 per hour which is 129 percent of the average labor shed wage rate. RISE grant recommended is \$1,669,870. Local participation is 20 percent or \$417,468 for a total cost of \$2,087,338. RISE cost per job assisted is \$11,928. Total capital investment per RISE dollar is \$40.04. He introduced Jamie Letzring, Oelwein City Administrator.

Ms. Letzring introduced the delegation. The company is East Penn Manufacturing, a private family-owned company operating the largest single site lead acid battery manufacturing facility in the world. They are headquartered in Lyon Station, Pennsylvania, where they have a 500-acre facility that has been there since 1946, and they employ approximately 6,500 people at that facility. The complex in Lyon Station includes four automotive battery plants, an industrial battery plant, specialty battery plant, state-of-the-art oxide facility, an innovative recycling infrastructure and dozens of vertically integrated capabilities and other support facilities. East Penn currently employs 80 employees in Oelwein and will retain those 80 jobs in addition to adding 350 new jobs at a very competitive wage for their region. The primary focus of the Oelwein plant will be a fill, form and finish center which means they will ship dry unformed finished batteries to Oelwein where the batteries will be charged, warehoused, and distributed. Their truck traffic counts at this time are about 50 trucks a day for shipping, receiving and deliveries so part of the reason for a through street is so they can divert truck traffic to Iowa 3, Iowa 150 or Iowa 281 to avoid Oelwein's downtown business district.

Commissioner Rose asked if this is Oelwein's first RISE grant. Ms. Letzring said the city received a RISE grant ten years or so ago.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Reasner moved, Commissioner Rose seconded the Commission, based on the capital investment and job creation commitments, award a RISE grant of \$1,669,870 or up to 80 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE Fund. Commissioner Miles absent, remaining Commissioners voted aye.







DISCUSSION/BACKGROUND:

The city of Marshalltown submitted a RISE Immediate Opportunity application requesting a grant to assist in construction of approximately 1,000 feet of South Street located on the southeast side of town. This project is anticipated to be completed by July 2016.

Because this project will provide access to more than 32 acres for industrial purposes and to maximize RISE support for this project, staff evaluated the application as a RISE Local Development project.

The evaluation and rating for the project will be discussed.

PROPOSAL/ACTION RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Commission, based on the capital investment commitment and potential for future job creation, reclassify the project as a RISE Local Development project in the February 2015 round of applications and award a RISE grant of \$360,315 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE Fund.

Craig Markley, Office of Systems Planning, reviewed an Immediate Opportunity RISE application from the city of Marshalltown to construct approximately 1,000 feet of South Street located on the southeast side of town. Because this project will provide access to more than 32 acres for industrial purposes and to maximize RISE support, staff evaluated the application as a RISE Local Development project. Under RISE Local Development criteria, the project scored 46 points. Total estimated project cost is \$720,630. The city is requesting a RISE grant of \$360,315 and will be providing a 50 percent local match. He introduced Tom Deimerly, Executive Director, Marshall Economic Development Impact Committee.

Mr. Deimerly said he has been before the Commission before on this project which started roughly four years ago. Things change in business and the business they were working with, TIG Manufacturing, went through some transitions as they evaluated the future of their company in Marshalltown or other locations in Iowa. They elected to make the capital investment in Marshalltown. TIG Manufacturing started in 1993 and is a small company with roughly 15 employees. They supply all the products that John Deere likes to have their name on so any kind of cleaners, fire extinguishers, anything that can be found in the cab of a tractor comes out of their distribution center. Some 21/2 years ago they began manufacturing engines that John Deere had taken out of their main production. That necessitated the need for more square footage so they have elected to purchase roughly 16 acres in Marshalltown's industrial park. Their plan is to put up a 30,000 sq. ft. building expandable to 120,000 sq. ft. They have a lot of longterm plans as it relates to the community and company. In addition, this project will open roughly 41 acres to the south for future development. In the area is an independently owned rail line tied with a previous RISE project. The Menards project is going incredibly well and they plan to go operational late 2015 or early 2016. The rail line is now owned by Menards as a partner with the city so as they open these additional acres, they will be able to bring that rail in and have more rail service to sites. He expressed appreciation for the Commission's consideration of the project.

Mr. Markley reviewed staff's recommendation.

Commissioner Rose moved, Commissioner Yanney seconded the Commission, based on the capital investment commitment and potential for future job creation, reclassify the project as a RISE Local Development project in the February 2015 round of applications and award a RISE grant of \$360,315 or up to 50 percent of the total RISE-eligible project cost, whichever is less, from the city share of the RISE fund.

For clarification, Commissioner Reasner said this was a previous RISE grant; the original one was rescinded and we have transitioned to this new RISE grant. Mr. Markley said with Commission approval of this RISE grant, they will rescind the previous award of \$237,616.

Commissioner Miles absent; remaining Commissioners voted aye.
