FEATURED SPEAKERS

PROFESSOR JOHN EDWARD TERRELL

Author & Regenstein Curator of Pacific Anthropology at the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago



His recent book **A Talent for Friendship: Rediscovery of a Remarkable Trait** (Oxford, 2015) is a lively, provocative text that presents a new way to understand friendship. Professor John Terrell argues that the ability to make friends is an evolved human trait not unlike our ability to walk

upright on two legs or our capacity for speech and complex abstract reasoning. Terrell charts how this trait has evolved by investigating two unique functions of the human brain: the ability to remake the outside world to suit our collective needs, and our capacity to escape into our own inner thoughts and imagine how things might and ought to be.

He is currently working with his son Gabriel on a new book with the working title **Why We Do Stupid Things** in which they are taking a hard look at what modern psychology, neuroscience, and other allied sciences are now able to tell us about how the brain works with the world to make us who we are. Using current events, the latest scientific findings, and humor, they not only show us how we all live in our fantasies all of the time and must struggle to stay in touch with reality, but also explain why biological evolution has made us both wise and foolish.

John Edward Terrell, A.B., A.M., Ph.D. (Harvard) has long been recognized as one of the world's leading experts on the peopling of the Oceania and the remarkable biological, cultural, and linguistic diversity of modern Pacific Islanders. He is also a pioneer in the study of global human biogeography, baseline probability analysis, and the application of social network analysis in archaeology and anthropology. Since 1971 he has been the Pacific Islands curator at the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago where he now holds the endowed Regenstein Curatorship of Pacific Anthropology established there in 2005. His is a strong voice for recognizing museums today as key players in global heritage management.

Dr. Richard Deming is medical director of Mercy Cancer Center in Des Moines, Iowa. He received a bachelor's degree at South Dakota State University and his medical degree at Creighton University. Dr. Deming is known in the community for the compassionate care he

provides cancer patients and their families. He is involved in many national, state, and community organizations and is the recipient of numerous awards. He was awarded the Lane Adams Award by the American Cancer Society for excellence and compassion in patient care. He is the recipient of "the one hundred" Award by Massachusetts General Hospital for his work with cancer survivors. He was awarded the Iowa Cancer Champion Award for his tireless efforts in the field of advocacy. Last year he received the Iowa Star Award from the Des Moines Register for making a measurable difference within the community, striving to improve the quality of life for families, for our most vulnerable, and for Iowans everywhere.

Dr. Deming is also the founder of **Above + Beyond Cancer**, a non-profit organization dedicated to elevating the lives of those touched by cancer. Dr. Deming has led cancer survivors on inspirational mind-body-spirit pilgrimages to Mount Everest, Mount Kilimanjaro, and Machu Picchu. He is dedicated to the principals of human dignity, social justice, and compassion. He is inspired by the courage and compassion of his patients and their families. His greatest ambition is to encourage others to pursue lives of meaning, purpose, passion, and compassion.



USNG Iowa: Creating a common “language of location”

The USNG Iowa Summit, in partnership with the Iowa Trails Summit, is bringing together members of the GIS community, first responder community and interested volunteers and policy makers at all levels to spur the discussion of integrating the United States National Grid (USNG) into geo-referencing for all jurisdictions and emergency response agencies for enhanced incident response when on public lands or during major natural disasters.

Morning Sessions

First Responders often have the challenge of communicating clearly a location when there is not an exact address. The “language of location” created by using the United States National Grid (USNG) System quickly and accurately assists first responders to identify locations where there is no address and be able to clearly relay that location. Implementation of the USNG in Iowa will assist in improved geo-referencing communication on Iowa’s public lands. Morning courses will help local policy makers, volunteers, GIS experts, and first responders understand the value of USNG use on all public lands to include multi-use trails and waterway trails.

GIS Afternoon Breakout Sessions

Afternoon sessions will include discussion of GIS resources available for the GIS professional to create USNG based mapping.

First Responder Afternoon Breakout Sessions

Afternoon sessions will include hands on training at the Black Hawk County Firearms Training Range in map reading, land navigation, command and control and situational awareness using USNG across map and digital platforms.

USNG Iowa Summit objectives

- Provide a brief history of the United States National Grid development nationally and in Iowa.
- Discuss how the USNG fits into local and state jurisdictions’ emergency response plans and the liability impact if not integrated into emergency responses on non-addressed incidents.
- Understand the operational necessity for use of the USNG mapping tools to communicate location for better situational awareness, command and control and search and rescue for first responders at all levels.
- Understand how to identify, read, and relay USNG coordinates.
- Learn about the various technologies to include maps, smart phone apps and GPS receivers to identify USNG coordinates.
- Discuss how to implement the USNG in local jurisdictions.
