Problem Statement

Traffic management for work zones in rural two-lane two-way highways can be challenging as these often intersect with low volume side streets and access points. Residential Driveway Temporary Signal (RDTS) devices have provided a solution to improve mobility at residential access points and low volume side streets under experimental evaluations. The RDTS (formerly Driveway Assistance Device (DAD)) was approved by FHWA under Interim Approval 23 to control residential driveway traffic when entering a one-lane, two-way work zone.

Objectives

The project objectives are to build upon the work already done with RDTS and temporary signal systems by considering their on-site use at uncontrolled rural low-volume side streets and access points. Of particular interest is the ability of RDTSs to handle traffic on low volume side streets and access points with a focus on turning volumes related specifically to the designed turn lane storage capacity (i.e., the amount of left and right turn storage). Defined limitations related to mainline and side street or access point turning volume and turn lane storage capacity should be an outcome of the study.

Depending on the proposed study design, this project may require an experimental approach to traffic control evaluation as defined by the FHWA. All proposals that consider field data collection should take this into account and should include multiple sites in multiple states. The results should include guidance of these devices in these types of situations and potential wording for any future MUTCD language.

Proposal Restrictions

- Proposals are limited to 8 pages. Resumes of the principal investigator and other named team members, along with other relevant materials, may be provided for additional information in appendices, but the proposal itself shall be a stand-alone document. The proposer should not expect the reviewers to read appendices to be able to evaluate the merit of a proposal.
- The proposing entity must be a college or university located in one of the states pledging funds to the SWZDI TPF-5(545) pooled fund: Alaska, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Texas, or Wisconsin. The principal investigator and any co-principal investigator(s) must be a faculty or professional staff employed by the proposing entity.
- Proposals submitted by current SWZDI principal investigators that have projects one year or more behind their originally contracted end date will not be considered.
- o Individual respondents are limited to submitting on only one SWZDI proposal per year as either a principal investigator or co-principal investigator.
