

# Public Right of Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG)

- July 26, 2011
- Issued by the Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board (Access Board): August 8, 2023.
- Final Rule effective date: September 7, 2023
- Notice of proposed rulemaking (NPRM)
  - August 21, 2024
  - Comments due date: September 23, 2024

- The Department of Transportation (DOT or the Department) is proposing to amend its rules implementing the transportation provisions under
  - Title II, Part B, (State and local governments that provide public transportation), and
  - Title III (Public Accommodations, Private & non-for profit) .
- This proposed rule would adopt the Access Board's PROWAG into the Department's ADA regulations.
- When adopted, DOT's public right-of-way ADA standards will apply only to new construction and alterations of <u>transit stops</u> in the public right-ofway.
- <u>Pedestrian Access Routes</u> connecting transit shelters with boarding and alighting areas or boarding platforms.



- MUTCD 10th Edition, 2009
- A Final Rule adopting the 11th Edition of the MUTCD was published in the Federal Register *December 19, 2023*.
- Effective date: January 18, 2024
- States must adopt the MUTCD as their legal State standard for traffic control devices within two years from the effective date. January 18, 2026



## Interim approvals

The FHWA may issue Interim Approvals to allow the use of new traffic control devices between updates of the MUTCD.


### Bike/Ped interim approvals

- Separated bike lanes and protected intersections
- Standardized signing for two-way separated bike lanes
- Green and red colored pavement markings for bikes and buses
- Rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFB)
- Bicycle signal faces
- Two-stage bicycle turn boxes
- Separated crossings for mode-separated shared use paths
- Contraflow bike lanes on one-way streets with parking on both sides

Drivers must yield the right of way to PEDESTRIANS.

'PEDESTRIAN': ANY PERSON ON FOOT. **NOW** 

As of July 1, 2024



Drivers must yield the right of way to pedestrians, bicyclists, or any person on a PEDESTRIAN CONVEYANCE.

'PEDESTRIAN CONVEYANCE': ANY HUMAN-POWERED DEVICE BY WHICH A PEDESTRIAN MAY MOVE OTHER THAN BY WALKING OR BY WHICH A PEDESTRIAN MAY MOVE ANOTHER PERSON.

NOTE: Any time we refer to "pedestrian(s)" in this manual, we are referring to pedestrians AND pedestrian conveyances.
