IOWA SCENIC BYWAYS PROGRAM

The Iowa scenic byway routes exist to provide Iowans and visitors a pleasurable driving experience that is unusually scenic and has interesting landscapes.

The intent of the 1988 program was to identify, protect, and enhance roadways and assets which exemplified the state's scenic qualities and historic resources.

Program Framework of 1988 Iowa legislation and administrative code

- Iowa DOT is directed to evaluate, designate, and provide signs for recognized Iowa Byways
- Local volunteer work and cooperation between citizens, organizations, local governments, and the Iowa DOT
- Economic development and tourism efforts are NOT assigned to the Iowa DOT

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DESIGNATIONS (Scenic, Heritage) IN IOWA

There are 14 designated byways in Iowa.

2021: The US DOT approved 49 designations to the America's Byways® collection, including 15 All-American Roads and 34 National Scenic Byways in 28 states.

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ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT/TOURISM IN IOWA

Visitors to Iowa spent \$7.5 billion across various sectors in 2024.

Of the \$7.5 billion spent, transportation purchases, including both ground and air, accounted for \$1.9 billion—25% of all visitor spending.

Visitors spent 23%, \$1.7 billion, of their budget on food and beverages.



Tourism in Iowa has an impact on the economy. These tourism statistics have been provided from *Tourism Economics* through the Iowa Tourism Office.

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NATIONAL SCENIC BYWAY PROGRAM (FHWA) GRANTS [1991-2024]

- **1991:** Established under the **Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act** that provided **\$74.3 million** in discretionary grants
- **1998:** The **Transportation Equity Act** for the 21st Century (TEA-21) authorized **\$148 million** for technical assistance & NSB grants.
- **2005-2012:** The **Safe, Accountable, Flexible, and Efficient Transportation Equity Act – (SAFETEA-LU)** authorized **\$175 million** for technical assistance and grants to States and Indian Tribes.
- **2021:** The **Dept. of Transportation Appropriations Act** appropriated **\$16 million** for the NSBP.
- **2022:** The **Consolidated Appropriations Act** appropriated **\$6 million** for grants and technical assistance to States or Indian Tribes
- **2023:** The **Consolidated Appropriations Act** appropriated **\$20 million** for NSBP.
- **2024:** The **Consolidated Appropriations Act** appropriated **7.5 million** for NSBP Grants and Technical Assistance.
