



Welcome . . . to Iowa's 74 State Parks. Iowa, a state less than a century old, is a young state, yet leads the nation in farming, literacy and per-capita wealth. Included in its borders is almost a fourth of the most valuable farm land in the nation. Only 20 years ago the state did not possess a single state park.

During the past 20 years 74 park areas have been acquired and developed for recreational purposes. More than 20,000 acres have been acquired for park purposes, areas rich in Iowa history, scenic grandeur of rocky canyons,

Iowa's Parks offer features interesting to all and some have historical or memorial associations in addition to their recreational aspects. The Iowa Parks are scattered throughout the state. Usually there are several areas within a two hour drive for most Iowa families.

Fine highways offer convenient access to the parks during all seasons of the year.

Most favored of all the forms of recreation in Iowa's Parks is picnicking. Thousands of visitors each year find restful relaxation and enjoyment in picnics large and small in the picnic areas. All the parks recommended for picnicking in the table below are equipped with tables, stoves and pure water. You'll find the picnic grounds in Iowa's Parks particularly inviting. They are usually located in the more shaded, cooler sections of the park and offer much in the way of scenic views of the surrounding terrain. Picnicking is extremely enjoyable in April and May. During the hot months of July and August the cool, shady glades and moist glens offer protection from excessive heat. In most of the parks wood is provided near the stove, but in some instances a small charge is made for a bundle of wood. In these cases, wood may be purchased from the custodian.

Iowa's parks offer great possibilities for education in botany, forestry, geology and natural history. Park use studies have indicated that, in many instances, the natural facilities of park areas are not sufficiently used. To enable visitors to best utilize the resources of the vast nature laboratories in our parks, naturalists have been stationed in certain of these areas. The services of these trained men are available at all times during the summer season in the conducting of tours of the park and in guiding visitors along trails. Their function is to advise and encourage visitors in the study and appreciation of nature. The naturalist program, started in 1937, has met with the approval of

visitors and tours have been well attended. In June of 1939 there were park naturalists stationed in nine state parks. In secluded glens and along the quiet trails visitors may discover the beauties of nature. A variety of trees, shrubs and wild flowers in profusion offer inducement for long refreshing walks. Wild flowers in vast quantities are to be found in all the state parks. Over 350 varieties of wild flowers may be found in Lacey-Keosauqua Park. In Waubonsie and Stone Parks in western Iowa desert flowers may be seen in the loess bluffs of the area. Ledges State Park in Boone county offers an abundance of wild flowers to the spring-

In those state parks where over-night cabins are available, cabin camping has proved very popular. A total of 48 cabins, located in seven parks are available for use by visitors. These cabins may be rented for periods from one day to two weeks and rent for \$2 per night, \$4 per week-end or \$9 per week per cabin. Many of the rental cabins are supplied with running water and toilets and several of them are equipped with fireplaces so that they may be used throughout the year. Cabins are available at the following state parks: Backbone, Dolliver-Memorial, Lake Ahquabi, Lake Wapello, Ledges, Palisades-Kepler and Pine

Lake. Reservations for cabins should be made in advance and inquiries may be addressed to the custodians in the parks having cabins. Group camps, accommodating up to 50 campers, are available at Dolliver-Memorial and Ahquabi Parks. Each camp has eight cabins, central mess hall, toilets and shower building and a leader's cabin. At Palisades-Kepler and Backbone Parks group camp facilities for smaller groups are available. Group camp reservations and additional information concerning these camps may be obtained through the State Conservation Commission, 10th and Mulberry, Des Moines.





The Iowa State Parks and Preserves do not have open and closed seasons. The Conservation Commission believes that your parks should be open to the public at all times, and opportunities have been provided for sport, recreation, and relaxation throughout the year. Each period offers new views, new activities, and new enjoyment. The floral progression begins with the appearance of the snow trillium and continues until late fall when the witchhazel blooms. Swimming and the other aquatic sports are ushered in by the month of June. September brings the beautiful fall season with the asters and the brilliant sumac. October and November present the golden panorama of autumn coloring, and such activities as hiking, riding, and wiener roasts. During the winter months, skiing, tobogganing, and skating are the chief attractions. Throughout the year lodges, warm in the winter, cool and inviting in the summer, are available for group meetings and parties.




Swimming ranks next to picnicking in favor of park visitors and swimming facilities are provided at supervised beaches in 12 of the state parks. The small fee charged defrays the cost of life guards, cleaning the beach and keeping dressing rooms in a sanitary condition. Suits and towels may be rented and checking service is provided at all bath houses. Refreshments may be obtained at the beaches. Boats are available for rent in many of the state parks and on most of the state recreational lakes. On the larger lakes sailboating is a popular form of recreation. The operation of motor boats and outboard craft is strictly prohibited on the state's 18 artificial lakes.







Many visitors take advantage of the recreational advantages available in Iowa's State Parks in winter. Opportunities for participation in winter sports have not been neglected in the parks. In a number of the areas ice skating is a popular winter activity and several areas offer ski runs. Toboggan enthusiasts find the toboggan slides at Pine Lake and Fort Defiance State Parks offer excellent opportunities for wintertime sport. Warm shelters are conveniently





State forest lands, including 12,000 acres, are located in three general regions of the state. the southern region in Lucas and Monroe counties, the southeastern region in Lee and Van Buren counties and the northeastern region in Clayton and Allamakee counties. In addition to preserving these woodlands it is planned that these state forest areas will become areas that demonstrate the proper use of the land and water in the areas.
