6 State Capitol Building

For more than a century, the golden dome of the State Capitol has been a symbol of Iowa government as well as the state's political center. Dedicated in 1884 and completed in 1886, the limestone, granite and

sandstone Capitol is famous for its 23-carat gold-covered dome, which towers 275 feet above the grounds. One of the nation's finest examples of 19th century architecture, the Iow Statehouse is surrounded by statues and monuments. Highlights include the grand staircase, three-story rotunda and Law Library.

Plum Grove **Historic Home**

Iowa's first territorial governor, Robert Lucas, and his wife lived in this seven-room Greek Revival house, which was constructed from local red brick. The National Society





TRUCK PERMITS - A commercial vehicle permit center is located at Park Fair Mall, 100 Euclid Ave., Des Moines, IA 50313-0382, which is one mile south of Interstate 35/80. To reach the center go south on Northeast 14th Street (U.S. 69) from I-35/80 Exit 136 to Euclid Avenue, and then west on Euclid to Second Avenue. The office entrance is located on the north side of Park Fair Mall. Service is available on reciprocity, trip, overdimension and overweight permits, and fuel permit applications for lowa and other states. Call 515-237-3264.

CAR TROUBLE - If you have trouble with your vehicle, drive off the roadway to an emergency area such as the shoulder; turn on the emergency flashers; raise the hood; and tie a cloth to the antenna or door handle. Passing motorists are encouraged to help, or to notify law enforcement officers.

ACCIDENTS - Notify law enforcement officers if an accident results in injury, death or damage to property on or adjacent to the highway. If you are involved in an accident, do not leave the accident scene. Do not move injured persons unless they are in further danger; seek qualified help for them. If you are involved in the accident, submit a written report to the lowa DOT within three days. Report forms are available from local police departments, county sheriffs or the Iowa State Patrol.


TAKE A SECOND AND DEVELOP A LIFETIME HABIT










SIOUX CITY SCALE OF MILES For local bus information

Rediscover Fort Atkinson, a federal military post built in 1842 to maintain order among various Native American tribes that were displaced by European-American settlers. Research and archaeological surveys have guided reconstruction of portions of the original fort, which had 28 buildings and a stockade wall.
